Part 1

Take a look at the image on pages 4-5. Who do you think these people are? What are they doing? How do you think this relates to Anglo-Saxon times?

Soldiers, Anglo-Saxons, defending British

Fighting/attacking/defending their land

Anglo-Saxon times was violent / there were many invasions in Anglo-Saxon times

Part 2

Read the first five points on page 4 and answer the following: Where did the Anglo-Saxons come from? Were the Anglo-Saxons all one people? Why weren't the Anglo-Saxon raids in the fourth century successful? What happened to the Anglo-Saxons after the Romans left Britain?

Answer ...

Where did the Anglo-Saxons come from? Denmark, Germany and the Netherlands Were the Anglo-Saxons all one people? No, they were different tribes Why weren't the Anglo-Saxon raids in the fourth century successful? The Romans beat them back

What happened to the Anglo-Saxons after the Romans left Britain? The British invited them to come and help keep out invaders from Scotland and Ireland, and the Anglo-Saxons soon took over

Part 3

Read points 6-9 on page 5 and answer the following: What were the largest Anglo-Saxon kingdoms? What people invaded Britain during Anglo-Saxon times? What happened to them? How did Anglo-Saxon times end?

Answer ...

What were the largest Anglo-Saxon kingdoms? Wessex, Mercia, Northumbria What people invaded Britain during Anglo-Saxon times? What happened to them? Vikings. They eventually settled in Britain and eventually merged into one kingdom with the Anglo-Saxons

How did Anglo-Saxon times end? The Normans invaded and took over
