Everything here is based on our Curriculum Visions book Rich and poor in Tudor times.

In this segment we are going to think about who the Tudors were and how long they ruled.

You will need to go to the cover of the book.

Part 1

Play the video, which tells about the famous kings and queens of Tudor times.
Who were the Tudors descended from?

Answer.....

Powerful nobles, the House of York (white rose) and House of Lancaster (red rose).

What ended The Wars of the Roses?

Answer.....

When Henry VII of the House of Lancaster arranged to marry Elizabeth from the House of York.

What is an arranged marriage and why is it important?

Answer.....

It makes a marriage of people who are not necessarily in love but who understand that being married will be politically useful for the families, and in this case for the whole of England.

Who were the most famous Tudors?

Answer.....

Henry VIII and Elizabeth I (because of their influence on the history of the country and because of events that happened in their reigns: divorce for Henry, Armada for Elizabeth)

What was the problem with the marriage between Henry and Katherine of Aragon?

Answer.....

She did not bear Henry and sons to continue the royal male line.

What happened to Anne Boleyn?

Answer.....

She was beheaded

What kind of church was the Church of England?

Answer.....

Protestant

Who was the mother of Queen Elizabeth I?

Answer.....

Anne Boleyn
