

#### ABRAHAM LINCOLN

Abraham Lincoln (February 12, 1809 –April 15, 1865) was the first president to be assassinated. Lincoln is known for being president during the Civil War.

At the end of his term, he had seen the abolition of slavery and kept the Union together – if only by force, and he had strengthened the position of the federal government. He had even begun to modernize the economy. And all that happened in five short years. That is why he is often seen as one of the greatest presidents.

Lincoln was born in Hodgenville, Kentucky. He came from a poor background on the western frontier, and became a self-educated lawyer in Illinois. He was keen on anything that would help build a stronger America, including the founding of banks, building of railways and factories. As a result, the north surged ahead and became an economic powerhouse, while the south fell behind because it depended on farming and was not industrializing fast enough. He was against the war with Mexico and spoke out against slavery.

Lincoln was nominated for president by the Republican Party in 1860. He won despite no support from the southern states. But the result of his election was dramatic. Seven southern states immediately joined to form the Confederacy. The Confederates attacked Fort Sumter on April 12, 1861, forcing Lincoln to get engaged in the war effort.

He put forward the Emancipation Proclamation in 1863, using the Army to protect escaped slaves, and forced through the Thirteenth Amendment to the United States Constitution, which permanently outlawed slavery. Lincoln was a good commander, overseeing the strategy alongside his generals such as commanding general Ulysses Grant.

Lincoln blockaded the South so that it could not sell its farm products nor get armaments. Lincoln was a forceful leader when necessary, but also a moderate who wanted reconciliation with the south. He was hated by many as a result, and especially by those in the south, who plotted to assassinate him.

Lincoln was a great speaker, which meant he could, using newspapers, get his message over to the country. His most famous speech was the Gettysburg Address of 1863.

Six days after the surrender of Confederates, Lincoln was assassinated by John Wilkes Booth, a Confederate sympathizer, at Ford's Theater in Washington D.C. He is buried in Springfield, Illinois, the state he always thought of as his home.
