

ALEXANDER GRAHAM BELL

Alexander Graham Bell was born in Edinburgh, Scotland, on March 3, 1847. He was interested in speech and communication from an early age, because his father worked in speech therapy, and his mother was partially deaf.

As a teenager, Bell went to London and worked with the deaf alongside his father. But just as he was gaining a good reputation in London, his family wanted to move to America. This was because Bell's father had traveled to America and found the air healthier than in polluted London. Alexander Graham Bell was reluctant to leave at first. But then his brothers caught tuberculosis, and he could see why they needed to move.

The Bells settled in Ontario, Canada in 1870. Before long, Alexander Graham Bell had moved to Boston. He was still working on speech and communication. He began to focus on telegraph messages, and then the idea of transmitting speech through wires.

Bell asked an electrician, Thomas Watson, to work for him. Bell came up with ideas for how a voice transmitter, or telephone, could work, and Watson put the ideas into practice to test them. Meanwhile, Bell's investors got a patent for the idea of a telephone because they could see it would change the way people communicate forever.

On March 10, 1876, something amazing happened. While working on a telephone in his workshop, Bell spoke to Watson, who was in another room. The message was "Mr. Watson – Come here – I want to see you", and Watson heard it. The first successful telephone call had been made.

After this success, Bell founded the Bell Telephone Company, and demonstrated his invention to the world. Other inventors claimed to have invented the telephone before Bell, but Bell's patent protected him. Bell also worked with the likes of Thomas Edison to improve the telephone design. They added a microphone so people could talk at normal volume over the telephone.

Bell handed over control of the business to others, as he was more interested in research. While the telephone network in America grew ever larger, Bell opened the Volta Laboratory, and continued to research into helping deaf people. In 1915, Bell spoke from New York to Watson, who was in San Francisco. It was the first telephone call across the American continent. Bell died in Canada in 1922.
