
BEN HOLLADAY



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Known as the 'Stagecoach King', Ben Holladay was born on October 14, 1819 in Kentucky. His father had been a guide for wagons traveling through the Cumberland Gap in Kentucky. Holladay started as a businessman in Missouri, where he supplied General Stephen Watts Kearney during the Mexican-American War.

After that, Holladay focused on making money through transportation ventures. During the 1849 California Gold Rush, he built and ran the Overland Stage to California.

In the mid-1860s, Holladay took over the Pony Express, and set up a mail service to Salt Lake City, Utah. The old Oregon Trail and Pony Express routes had become difficult because Native Americans sometimes attacked people along them. But Holladay's new route made it safer to travel and carry goods.

But before long, railroads were threatening to take over stagecoaches as the most important and profitable form of transport. And so Holladay moved to Oregon to start in the railroad business, where the money lay. There was a competition to build a railroad alongside the Willamette River – whoever laid the first twenty miles of track would win the contract to build the rest. Holladay worked on the east side of the River, and won the competition.

Holladay took over and expanded the railroad lines on both sides of the river until 1873. That year there was a financial crisis, and Holladay lost much of his money. He lost control of the railroads in 1876, and he died eleven years later.
