
FRANCIS HOPKINSON



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Born in 1737 in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, Francis Hopkinson was a bright and talented man who contributed to the founding of the United States after it gained independence from Britain. Hopkinson was educated in law in Philadelphia, and went on to become a customs officer in Delaware.

During the American Revolution, Hopkinson supported independence, believing that a strong government for the new American nation was crucial. While the war was underway, Hopkinson held various public offices, including as a judge in Pennsylvania.

Hopkinson had a talent for music, so he wrote wartime patriotic songs, such as "The Battle of the Kegs". It referred to a time when barrels of gunpowder floated down the Delaware River, and caused panic on the British ships moored there. Hopkinson also wrote satirical pieces of writing.

In 1776, Hopkinson represented New Jersey at the Continental Congress, and he signed the Declaration of Independence. In 1787, there was a convention to decide on a constitution for the new United States. Hopkinson actively supported the proposed constitution, though others wanted a less powerful central government. But Hopkinson's side won out in the end, when the Constitution was made official. Hopkinson also worked on designs for the United States flag and Great Seal.

In later life, Hopkinson was a district judge in Pennsylvania until the time of his death on May 9, 1791.
