
JESSE JACKSON



JESSE JACKSON

Reverend Jesse Jackson was born Jesse Louis Burns on October 8, 1941, in Greenville, South Carolina. From an early age he experienced racial segregation. For example, he had to sit in a different part of buses than white people, and the black school that he attended was not as well-equipped as the nearby white school.

Jackson joined the civil rights movement while at college in Greensboro, North Carolina, by taking part in demonstrations and protests. After graduation, Jackson studied Divinity in Chicago, Illinois. He was later ordained as a Baptist minister, which developed his great public-speaking skills.

In 1965, Jackson joined Martin Luther King Jr.'s march in Selma, Alabama. Then he worked for King's civil rights organization, the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC). On April 4, 1968, King was assassinated at a hotel in Memphis, Tennessee. Jackson was at the same hotel at the time.

After that, Jackson resigned from the SCLC, and then founded his own organizations to push for better rights for black people, women, and homosexuals. In the 1979, Jackson went to South Africa, which was under apartheid at the time. He spoke out against this regime of racial discrimination and segregation.

Over the decades, Jackson had become more and more influential and well-known. And so he ran for president as a Democrat twice, in 1984 and 1988, but he was unsuccessful both times. During the 1980s and 1990s, Jackson worked to free American hostages in the Middle East and Cuba. In 2000, Jackson was awarded the Presidential Medal of Freedom.
