
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### JOHN WESLEY POWELL

John Wesley Powell was born on March 24, 1834 in Mount Morris, New York, but his family moved through Ohio and Wisconsin before settling in Illinois, where he studied.

Powell loved nature and outdoor pursuits. As a young man, Powell walked through Wisconsin for four months. He also rowed on many rivers, like the Mississippi, Ohio, and Illinois. In 1859, Powell became secretary of the Illinois Natural History Society.

But when the Civil War broke out, Powell stopped his expeditions, and fought for the Union side in the war. He was wounded at the Battle of Shiloh in Tennessee. Powell lost his right arm, though he survived and continued to fight in the war.

After the war, Powell wanted to explore more of the American West. He and nine men loaded up boats with supplies and set out on the Green River in Wyoming. Powell and his men then joined the Colorado River in Utah. Traveling down this river was the most dangerous part of their journey. Many people thought it was impossible to navigate.

Along the way down the Colorado River, Powell sometimes stopped to make measurements and collect specimens from the canyon walls above the river. But Powell and his men also encountered rapids. Sometimes, the men hauled their boats over land and joined the river lower down, but sometimes they just had to go over the rapids. They survived, but by the end of their trip, they had lost many of their supplies, and two of their boats altogether.

Eventually, Powell's expedition reached the Grand Canyon. It had not been explored thoroughly before by people other than the Native Americans who lived there.

This first trip was not enough for Powell, who wanted to go back and survey the Grand Canyon area properly, which he did in 1871. This time he helped produce maps and collect more scientific and geological specimens. Powell also took with him a camera to record the landscape and the people there so that more settlers could try to understand their way of life.

The expeditions showed Powell that water was vital to settlement. He thought that the American West should be settled carefully, and not randomly, or there would be drought problems. But Powell's ideas were not really listened to at the time.

After his Grand Canyon expeditions, Powell became head of the U.S. Geological Survey, which had been created not long before to bring together surveys of new lands. In 1889, Powell also helped found the National Geographic Society.

Towards the end of the 19th century, Powell became ill, and he died in Maine on September 23, 1902.
