



SAMUEL DE CHAMPLAIN

Samuel de Champlain was born in France in 1574. He was interested in geography, and was therefore a useful explorer on expeditions to North America in the early 1600s. Champlain and the others explored parts of what is now Canada and New England.

It was in 1604 that Samuel de Champlain led the first colonizing mission to a region known to the French as Acadia. He settled on what is now the Maine (USA)-New Brunswick (Canada) border, but it failed. In 1608, Champlain founded a colony at Quebec City, and this time it did succeed. On July 30, 1609, Champlain claimed Vermont as part of New France.

Champlain explored the Great Lakes a few years later, and claimed much of the Ohio Valley and Great Lakes area as New France. French colonies in the Great Lakes and in Canada grew over the following decades, as settlers arrived.

In 1615, Champlain explored farther inland in Canada than before. He had Native Americans from the Huron tribe to guide him, and he wrote about their way of life in great detail. When the Hurons attacked another tribe, Champlain and his men supported them, but Champlain was wounded by an arrow during the battle.

Later on, Champlain returned to Quebec and was its governor for a time. He died there on December 25, 1635.
