
WILLAM TO SHERMAN



WILLIAM T. SHERMAN

William Tecumseh Sherman was born on February 8, 1820, in Ohio. He graduated from West Point military academy in 1840, and was then posted to various places throughout the southern states without seeing any real military action. He quickly became bored of this, and so spent time in California while there was money to be made during and after the Gold Rush.

In 1859, Sherman went to Louisiana to run a military academy. With Civil War looking ever more likely, Sherman warned those looking to leave the Union that a war would be long and futile. But state after state in the south left the Union in 1861, including Louisiana. At that point, Sherman moved to St. Louis, Missouri, hoping to avoid the conflict.

But in the end, Sherman rejoined the army and fought for the Union side. At first, he complained about the situation, and kept declaring the Confederate side had more troops than it did. All this gave Sherman a reputation for being troubled, even unfit to serve, and he was given leave.

On his return, he served with General Ulysses S. Grant in the Army of West Tennessee. He commanded at the battle at Shiloh. It was a difficult battle against a strong Confederate side, but the Union secured victory in the end. Sherman and Grant continued to work together, and they eventually took Vicksburg from the enemy.

After that, Sherman commanded three armies, and he embarked on a destructive war path. His strategy was to make the enemy lose the will to fight. He did this by destroying huge areas of enemy land in Georgia on his 'March to the Sea'. On December 21, 1864, Sherman and his men captured the Georgian city of Savannah. Sherman then sent a message to Abraham Lincoln, offering him the city as a Christmas present.

Such actions ultimately helped the Union win the Civil War. When Ulysses S. Grant later became president, he made Sherman commander of the U.S Army. In this role, Sherman took a hard line against Native Americans who attacked settlers and railroad workers, although he spoke out against their mistreatment on reservations. In February 1891, Sherman died in New York City.
