
Lewis and Clark Louisiana Territory



Lewis and Clarks Louisiana Territory

In the summer of 1806, Lewis and Clark and their expedition wanted to explore the Louisiana Territory. The expedition split up to do this. Clark went along one river, while Lewis travelled along another river. Below is an extract from the diary of Lewis for Thursday July 3 1806. Remember that it is written in the language of the time, and some words might look unfamiliar at first.

"...we saddled our horses and set out. I took leave of my worthy friend and companion Capt. Clark and the party that accompanied him. I could not avoid feeling much concern on this occasion although I hoped this separation was only momentary.

"I proceeded down Clark's river seven miles with my part of nine men and five [American] Indians...These people now informed me that the road which they showed me at no great distance from our Camp would lead us up the East branch of Clark's river and [to] a river they called Cokahlarishkit or the river of the road to buffalo and thence to medicine river and the falls of the Missouri where we wished to go...

"I directed the hunters to turn out early in the morning and endeavour to kill some more meat for these people whom I was unwilling to leave without giving them a good supply of provision after their having been so obliging as to conduct us through those tremendous mountains."
