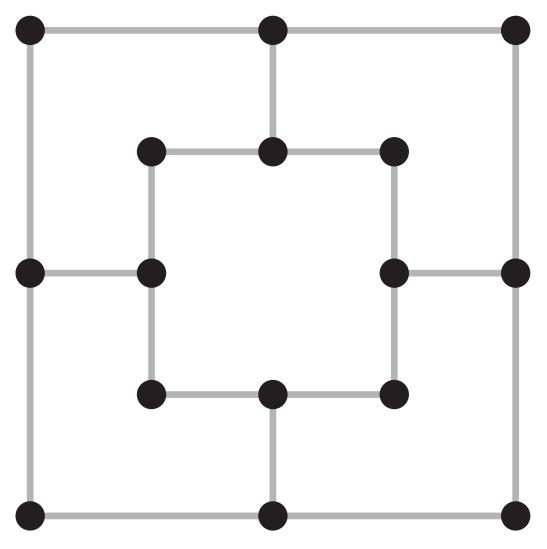
Make a board game called Merelles



- 1. Make a copy of the lines and dots above onto a large piece of card.
- 2. Cut out some circular counters from another piece of card or use ten small coins.
- 3. Choose one person to play with.
- 4. Take turns at putting counters on the dots on the board. You should try and get three counters in a row before your opponent does.
- 5. If you get all the counters on the board without getting three in a row, you can start to move the counters in the following way. You can move a counter to a dot next to it which has not got a counter.
- 6. When someone gets three counters in a row they are the winner.

Resources

A photocopy of the sheet. A large piece of card. A smaller piece of card from which to cut counters, scissors, coins.
