


We do not know anything about Luke's early life, but he joined the apostle Paul in around 51 AD and travelled with him while he preached. This is Luke's version of the birth of Jesus.

In those days The Roman emperor ruled that a census should be taken of the entire Roman world. And everyone went to their own town to register. So Joseph also went up from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to Judea, to Bethlehem. He went there to register with Mary, who was pledged to be married to him and was expecting a child. While they were there, the time came for the baby to be born, and she gave birth to her firstborn, a son. She wrapped him in cloths and placed him in a manger, because there was no room available for them in any house.


- 1 Write a heading for your summary.





- 4 Why do you think the angel appeared to some shepherds, instead of to more important people?




