Heachings of Jesus

Much of the New Testament is about the teachings of Jesus. Jesus often taught using stories that everyone could understand. But they were used to show a general principle. Here is one of them.

In Jesus' time, the Samaritans lived in a region of ancient Palestine called Samaria. The Samaritans were Hebrews but they followed a different form of Judaism than the rest of the Jewish people, and in the past had denied they were Jews. Other Jews looked down on the Samaritans and despised them because there was a long history of war and hatred between Jews and Samaritans. Jews and Samaritans both lived under Roman rule, but were sworn enemies. Levites were a group of Jews who had been given special authority by God to make sacrifices in the Temple.

On one occasion an expert in Jewish religious law stood up to test Jesus. "Teacher," he asked, "what must I do to inherit eternal life?"

"What is written in the Law?" he replied. "How do you read it?" He answered, "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength and with all your mind'; and, 'Love your neighbour as yourself.'"

"You have answered correctly," Jesus replied. "Do this and you will live." But the man wanted to justify himself, so he asked Jesus, "And who is my neighbour?"

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In reply Jesus said: "A man was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho, when he was attacked by robbers. They stripped him of his clothes, beat him and went away, leaving him half dead. A priest happened to be going down the same road, and when he saw the man, he passed by on the other side. So too, a Levite, when he came to the place and saw him, passed by on the other side. But a Samaritan, as he travelled, came where the man was; and when he saw him, he took pity on him. He went to him and bandaged his wounds, pouring on oil and wine. Then he put the man on his own donkey, brought him to an inn and took care of him. The next day he took out two denarii and gave them to the innkeeper. 'Look after him,' he said, 'and when I return, I will reimburse you for any extra expense you may have.'

"Which of these three do you think was a neighbour to the man who fell into the hands of robbers?" The expert in the law replied, "The one who had mercy on him." Jesus told him, "Go and do likewise."






- If you saw someone by the side of the road whose car was broken down, what would you do?
