Moses later married and had a family, but one day, God tells Moses that he needs to return to Egypt to help his people.

There the angel of the LORD appeared to him in flames of fire from within a bush. Moses saw that though the bush was on fire it did not burn up. 



 - 5 Do you think Moses was afraid of going back to Egypt?


